Photo Credit: U.S. Army Medical Center at Fort Bliss On Feb. 23, a U.S. soldier stationed at the center was diagnosed with the virus, according to the federal health agency. The soldier contracted the virus while abroad, though it is unclear if he contracted it in the U.S. The Army soldier was hospitalized on Feb. 23 after exhibiting symptoms and has since been quarantined in isolation. The man's condition has since deteriorated and he has been placed in intensive care, according to the hospital. The patient is a 39-year-old male, said Lt. Col. David Delaney, a spokesperson for the hospital. He's also an active duty member of the U.S. Army and a permanent resident of the U.S. He's been transferred from the care of UTMB to the care of the federal military hospital. As of Saturday, the patient was placed in the hospital's step-down unit and is expected to be transferred to Fort Bliss later this week, according to Lt. Col. David Delaney, a spokesperson for the hospital. After last week's diagnosis, the patient was quarantined to his room, according to Delaney. Anyone who came into contact with the patient during his quarantined period was immediately sent home, too. No one else showed signs of having been exposed to COVID-19 while the soldier was isolated at UTMB, Delaney said. "This is a case where two people were exposed and one person ended up being infected," said Dr. Mark A. Taylor, UTMB vice president and dean of medicine. "It's not unusual for cases like this to occur."
